

## I. INTRODUCTION AND PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

### *INTRODUCTION*

Academic year 2004-05 was most remarkable for its program development. The Commission embarked on two new programs for Spaniards and began negotiations for a third with the Regional Government of Andalusia, which, in a show of confidence in the Fulbright Program, advanced the Commission 75% (\$320,381) of the cost to fund graduate students as of academic year, 2006-07. Furthermore, on the American side, an agreement with the Regional Government of Madrid was signed to offer 15 English-language teaching assistantships for primary and secondary schools in the Madrid region, to which the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs (ECA) contributed another \$29,250 to cover international travel and other Fulbright benefits. The Commission also continued its agreements with the regional governments of Murcia and Navarra by providing each with a Fulbright teaching assistant to reinforce English learning.

Happy news was the notification that ECA increased its initial allocation of the Commission to one million dollars. The Bureau further enhanced the U.S.-Spain exchange program by contributing end-of-year funds to help launch projects focusing on diversity.

### *PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS*

The two new graduate student programs for Spaniards, co-sponsored by the Regional Government of Madrid and the Ministry of Public Administration were implemented. The former provided annually for five, renewable open-field grants and drew applicants from universities in the Madrid area. The public administration program financed two renewable grants for civil servants specializing in areas related to government service. The two programs together represented slightly more than a 6.5% increase in the annual Commission budget.

The Commission was especially pleased with the new teaching assistant project geared to immigrant audiences in the Madrid region. As of 2005-06, the American program will grow by 15 additional awards for recently graduated seniors to teach English as a foreign language,

or other subjects in English, in five primary and ten secondary schools. These educational centers are part of a bilingual program sponsored by the Regional Government of Madrid, and the schools designated to host Fulbright grantees boast a high percentage of immigrant children, including many from the Magreb. The funding pattern is binational, with Madrid covering most of the stipend and the Commission the remaining Fulbright benefits.

For a third year, U.S. Ambassador George Argyros donated \$50,000 from his private foundation to finance a Spanish graduate student in the U.S. These funds have permitted three Spaniards to study at the California Institute of Technology, Northwestern and Harvard.

### ***SPECIAL PROJECTS***

The two ambitious projects aimed at upgrading the Commission web site and management procedures that were launched in December 2003 are now close to completion. The grant management program that links the web site and data bases is in place and, since the beginning of year 2005, a number of the program announcements have opened with on-line applications easily accessible through the web site, thus greatly simplifying the task of the registry office. Furthermore, final candidates and grantees already have free and quick access to all the documentation pertaining to their programs through the restricted area of the web. Once again, we want to thank the U.S. Embassy for the grant that made possible these interdependent activities.

During the reporting year, further work went into the organization of the historical archive of the Commission. All records from 1958 to 1975 have been described, which involved more than 700 Spanish grantee files, and have also included the correspondence between the Commission and various U.S. and Spanish institutions and administrative documentation.



There are plans to present next year, to the general public, an introduction to the Commission archives. With this in mind, a good part of the documentation found to date has been digitalized: 405 images of postcards of the time, photographs, letters, posters, pamphlets, and newspaper articles on grantees or written by them.

The possibility for the public to consult the archival collection was made known at the time of publication of a book by the principal investigator of the project, Lorenzo Delgado, who together with María Dolores Elízalde, edited the book: "Spain and the United States during the 20th Century". Both investigators work at the High Council for Scientific Research.

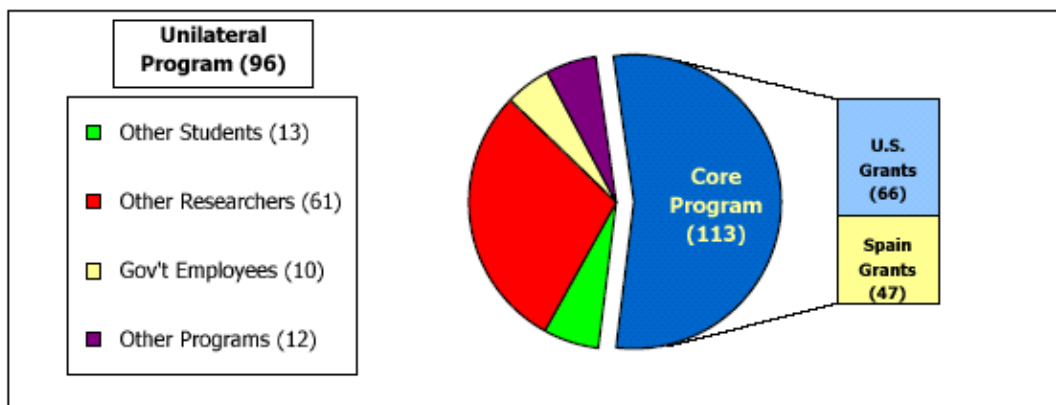

## ***PROGRAM PLAN AND ANNUAL REPORT COMPARISON***

In both the U.S. and Spanish programs, projection of grant numbers were met except for a variation of one additional grant in the U.S. program. While expected program size was well estimated, there were slight variations in grant category numbers.

In the U.S. program, six graduate student renewals were awarded from a redistribution of binational funding. In the Spanish program, the most notable variations are due to the cancellation of six annual student grants in collaboration with the Ministry of Health & Consumer Affairs, offset by a growth of 10 visiting scholar awards in collaboration with the Ministry of Education and Science.

## II. GRANTEE AND ALUMNI ACCOMPLISHMENTS

### ***U.S. PROGRAM***

2004-2005

*Denise Cinquegrana*, graduate student in Public Health, volunteered as a translator for the HIV/AIDS organization Fundació Lluita Contra el Sida at a public hospital and participated in meetings with doctors in HIV and Epidemiology departments.

*Cristina Chu*, graduate student in Urban Studies, gave briefings for mayors of small towns on the north coast (Asturias) on techniques for promoting and developing historical and architectural heritages.

*Trinity Hartman*, professional journalist, gave a multi-media presentation for a seminar entitled "Journalism of Violence and Peace," dealing with immigration and the conflicts surrounding it.

*Ann Kimball*, graduate political science student, was invited to join the NGO "Andalucia Acoge" federation-level Education Committee, to design policies and practices for education programs, multi-cultural study guides for teachers, and assist with volunteer training. Additionally, she designed youth empowerment activities in which she worked directly with 20 Moroccan, Iraqi, and Palestinian youth, and held training sessions for other adult volunteers.

*Allynn Lodge*, graduate student in education, was particularly active in contributing to intercultural exchange. She appeared on Spanish CNN as a panelist after one of the presidential debates, and coordinated a "Bringing the World Home" leadership retreat in Madrid, sponsored by Americans for Informed Democracy, for over 50 international participants.

*John Ochsendorf*, 2000-2001 U.S. grantee who holds a BSE from Cornell University and MSE from Princeton University, and completed his doctoral research in Spain for a Ph.D. in Civil Engineering at the University of Cambridge, was appointed member of the J. William Fulbright Foreign Scholarship Board. He carried out his academic research while giving seminars and working closely with colleagues in Barcelona and Madrid as well as developing his project in Bilbao, Palma de Mallorca, and Seville. He served as a member of the scientific committee for the International Conference on the History of Construction, held in Madrid in 2002. Since then, he has contributed to the Spanish Commission's U.S. grantee program.

## **SPANISH PROGRAM**

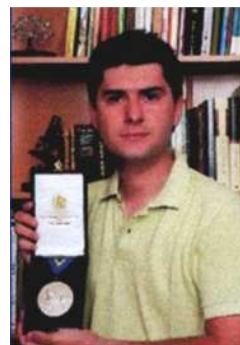
*Haizam Amirah Fernández*, 1999 Fulbright graduate student in Arab Studies, Georgetown University, has been hired as a Principal Researcher at the *Real Instituto Elcano de Estudios Internacionales y Estratégicos* (The Royal Elcano Institute for International and Strategic Studies). The Institute is a private foundation whose primary mission is to serve as a "think tank" and advisory forum for politicians, leaders of public and private institutions and public opinion makers.

*Liana Ardiles Lopez*, 2003 Fulbright/Ministry of Environment grantee carried out a professional affiliation with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). Ms. Ardiles is an expert on Hydraulic Structures, Dam Inspections and Emergency Management. During her training period at FEMA, she was a much sought-after guest speaker in various governmental agencies including the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC), U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) and the Bureau of Reclamation. She was highly praised for her contributions to agencies, especially in the area of comparative U.S./European standards in safety issues.

*Isabel Matilde Barrios Vicente*, 2003 Fulbright Spanish Teaching Assistant, Lycoming College, Williamsburg, PA, has edited a new version of the Spanish classic 16th century anonymous, literary masterpiece "El Lazarillo de Tormes," complete with introduction, explanatory notes and comments. Isabel, a native of Salamanca, like "El Lazarillo" (a young boy who accompanies and helps a blind man), developed this adaptation especially for young readers and students of Spanish as a second language.

*Maria Teresa Cavero Gomez*, 2002-2004 Fulbright student, John F. Kennedy School of Government, Harvard University, is currently working as an International Trade Researcher at Intermon Oxfam. Since 1956, this NGO has been working for the development and self-sufficiency of poor countries. Activities include collaborating on development projects, providing emergency relief, promoting fair trade, and increasing awareness and social mobilization campaigns to bring about change in national and international policies which affect the lives of millions of people.

*Javier García Martínez*, 2001 Fulbright visiting scholar in chemistry, MIT, has been designated Europe's top younger chemist of 2005 during the fifth annual Younger European Chemists' Conference organized by SET (Science, Engineering and Technology) for Europe and in association with Masaryk University, Brno and the Czech Chemical Society. Dr. García was awarded the prestigious Europa Medal and € 1,000 prize in recognition of the work carried out during his Fulbright grant on a novel form of carbon prepared by self-assembly.



*Mercedes Landete Sánchez*, 2000 Fulbright graduate student in International Relations and Journalism, City College of the City University of New York, has been named News Anchorwoman at the *Telemadrid* TV station. Before this last promotion, she had worked as a TV reporter for the station.

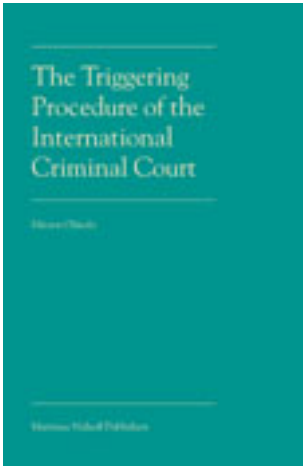


*Agustín Maravall Herrero*, 1971 Fulbright student in economics, U.Wisconsin-Madison, was the first non-North American to receive the 2004 Julius Shiskin Award for Economic Statistics, in recognition of his contributions to model-based seasonal adjustment and its acceptance by national statistical offices and central banks. The Washington Statistics Society, the National Association of Business Economists, and the Business and Economic Statistics Section of the American Statistical Association presented the award. He also received the 2005 King Jaime I Prize in Economics, honoring scientific research in Spain and sponsored by the Fundación Premios "Rey Jaime I" and the Regional Administration of Valencia. The selection committee included 13 Nobel Prize winners, and the prize contains a net financial reward of € 75,000.

*Patricia Martínez Zapico*, 2001 Fulbright Spanish Teaching Assistant, Assumption College, Worcester, MA, and former Erasmus Program participant, was chosen to represent all Erasmus students in a speech given on the occasion of the renowned Príncipe de Asturias Prize in International Cooperation, year 2004, being awarded to the mentioned Erasmus Program.

*Monica Nuñez Laiseca*, 2003 Fulbright student in museum studies, New York University curated the MediaNoche art gallery's exhibition "The Space Beyond Silence." The first of its kind, MediaNoche seeks to connect Spanish Harlem to all parts of the globe that recognize its long history of music, art, poetry and dance. The exhibit, which ran from February 10 – March 3, 2005, featured works by international artists and received support from: New York Foundation, Manhattan Neighborhood Network, Lower Manhattan Cultural Council, The Fund for Creative Communities, and former NY State Senator Olga Mendez.





Héctor Olásolo Alonso, 2001 Fulbright student in law, Columbia University, has published the book *The Triggering Procedure of the International Criminal Court* (ICC). In the case of the ICC it is not possible to determine a priori in which situations the ICC will be involved. As a result, the most relevant activity of the Court is the determination of those situations regarding which dormant jurisdiction of the Court will be triggered. The book constitutes the first comprehensive analysis of the proceedings that, prior to any criminal investigation, aim to make such a fundamental determination.

# Fulbright, una tarjeta de presentación influyente

Más de un centenar de españoles estudian en Estados Unidos cada año gracias al programa de becas más relevante

Durante muchos años, el Congreso americano puso la mayor parte del dinero, pero las tornas cambiaron a partir de los años setenta. Actualmente, el presupuesto de 5,4 millones de euros es cubierto en un 65 ó 75% por la Administración española (Gobierno central y autonómico de Madrid, Andalucía y Cataluña), cerca de una cuarta parte corresponde al Departamento de Estado

americano y menos de un 5% de la financiación proviene del sector privado. Entre los patrocinadores se encuentran la CEOE, Santander Central Hispano, El Corte Inglés y Coca-Cola.

**Intercambios y doctorados**  
"Las becas, para cursar máster o un doctorado, son las conocidas. Pero también tenemos programas para investigadores, artistas, periodistas e intercambio de profesores", explica María Jesús Pablos. La selección de los becarios se realiza con extremo cuidado. "Llevar a alguien a Estados Unidos es mucho más caro que traer a alguien aquí. Las becas para españoles están valoradas en más de 58.000 dólares", explica la directora de la Comisión. Sólo las dos matrículas ofrecidas por el Instituto Empresa para realizar su MBA Internacional en el país son comparables. El valor estimado en cada una es de 45.000 dólares. Además de tener un buen expediente académico y un excelente dominio del inglés, los candidatos españoles a una beca deben presentar un proyecto explicando qué desean hacer en Estados Unidos. Después de comparecer todos los currículos, la criba final se efectúa a través de una entrevista personal. Para 25 becas doctorales y de estudios artísticos hay medio millar de solicitudes. El perfil del fulbrighter es el de "una persona abierta, que desea especializarse en algo pero que no tenga decidido su futuro", señala Pablos. "La gente que mandamos a Estados Unidos, además de ir a adquirir una formación específica, va a vivir una sociedad multicultural, con sus logros y sus problemas. Eso es muy importante para ser un ciudadano responsable. Uno se tiene que alegrar para ver de cerca su propio país".

**JOSÉ MANUEL GONZÁLEZ-PÁRAMO**  
Consejero ejecutivo del BCE  
"Estaba bastante nervioso en la entrevista. Esperaba que me preguntasen por el expediente y, en cambio, me hicieron cuestiones personales", recuerda González-Páramo. El programa Fulbright le cubrió los dos primeros años del doctorado en Economía en la Universidad de Columbia. Como tantos otros becarios, demostró su valía y pudo acceder a otras ayudas para finalizar sus estudios. "Realizar la tesis en Estados Unidos me abrió las puertas en la universidad y grupos de investigación españoles".

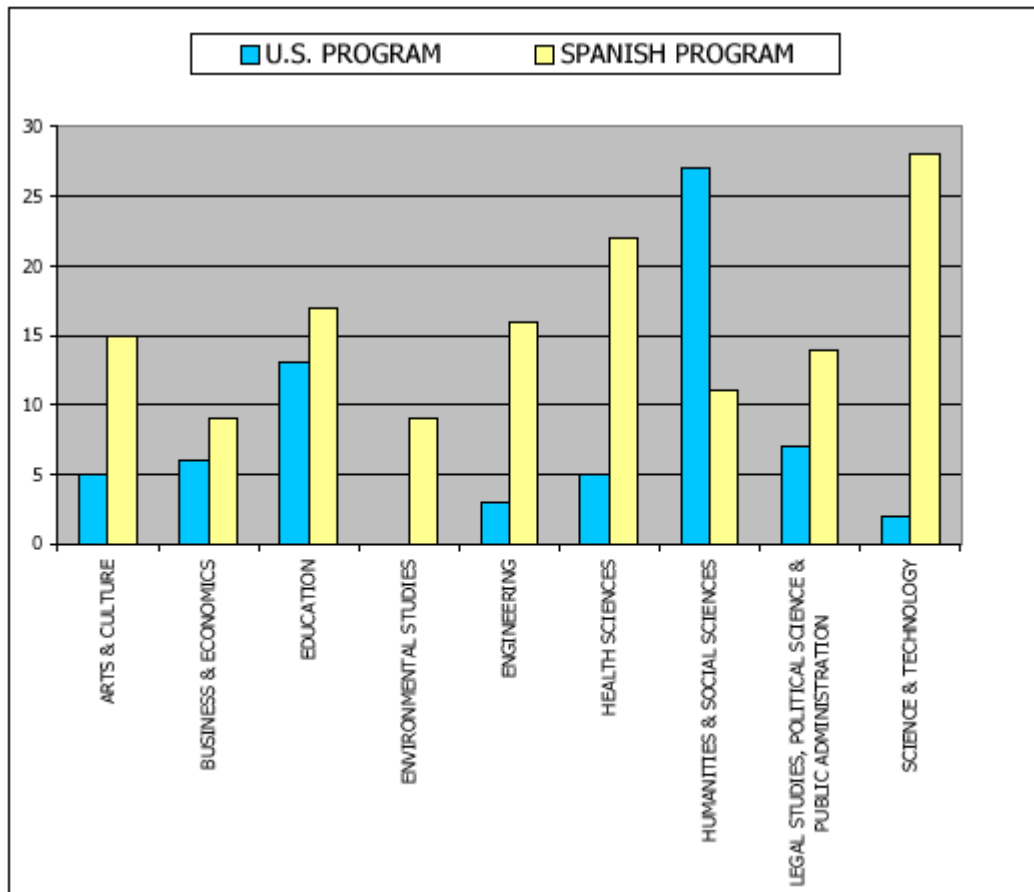
**LUIS ALBERTO MAÑAS**

Economista jefe del Banco de España  
Finalizados sus estudios de Ingeniería Agrónoma en Madrid, fue becado en 1971 para realizar un doctorado en Economía en la Universidad de Wisconsin. "Mi gran descubrimiento fue la estadística. Había estudiado algo aquí, pero no me gustó porque parecía una carta de fórmulas y recetas. Ahí me fasciné", dice. Hoy, Maravall es un estadístico de renombre internacional. Para él, "recibir una beca Fulbright todavía es un hecho diferencial porque el doctorado está poco estructurado en España".

**LUIS VAÑÓ**  
Presidente del Banco Árabe Español  
Su valoración del programa Fulbright es rotunda: "Todos los becarios tenemos una deuda de gratitud con el Gobierno americano". Un profesor suyo le animó a formarse en el extranjero después de terminar las licenciaturas de Economía y Derecho. Vañó fue de los primeros en cruzar el Atlántico. En 1960 puso rumbo a la Universidad de Chicago para realizar un máster en Economía. "Viajar me permitió recibir una formación en la que, ante todo, me dieron criterio profesional".

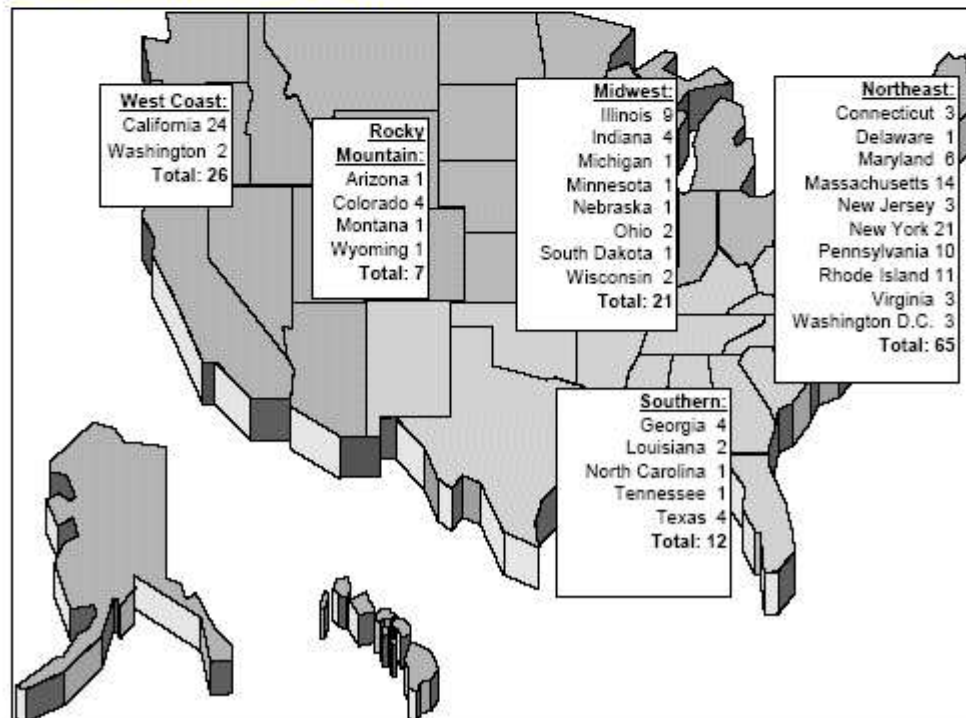


#### IV. GEOGRAPHIC DISTRIBUTION

## **V. NON-GRANT ACTIVITIES**

### ***REGIONAL ACTIVITIES***

The annual international seminars hosted by the Commissions in Germany ("The Fulbright Experience: Academic Achievement and Cultural Competence") and Belgium/Luxembourg ("Introduction to the European Union") once again gave grantees the opportunity to learn more about bilateral affairs between the U.S. and Europe and exposed them to contemporary issues.

The Commission sponsored one U.S. predoctoral student for each of the seminars. In their own words: "The Berlin Fulbright Seminar was a wonderful opportunity to meet both American and international scholars open to sharing and discussing their professional and personal experiences abroad. While quite motivating, this exchange of ideas and experiences is also a vital part of fostering international relations." "Before I went to the EU conference, I knew very little about its purpose and structure. Now I understand how members are selected, some of the problems they face, and the huge potential it has."

### ***ACADEMIC INFORMATION SERVICE***

#### **Mission and Services**

The Information Service informs the general public in Spain on Fulbright grant opportunities and provides free, unbiased and accurate information on study at U.S. universities and English language schools. U.S. citizens receive guidance on study opportunities in Spain. The Information Service maintains a reference library, holds group and individual advising sessions and makes test preparation materials available to the public.

Services are offered free of charge; however, the service does recover some costs, up to \$900, for photocopies and sales of TOEFL, GRE and GMAT test preparation materials.

In AY 2004-2005, visits to the library increased sharply (+92.9%) for the first time in several years. Though the Educational Adviser continued to facilitate and encourage use of the Internet, efforts were also made to increase attendance of group information sessions and use of the reference library for research. In addition to visits to the center's webpages, e-mail and telephone continued to be the preferred means of inquiry for most advisees, reflecting 45.1% and 29.4% increases, respectively. The service's webpages received a total of 104,427 hits, bringing the total number of public served, both in person and via the Internet, up to **106,772**.



## Continuing Initiatives

The Information Service continues to coordinate its internship program for U.S. university students, in which four interns participated during AY 2004-05. Numerous volunteers on study abroad programs in Madrid also continue to provide support for the center, which also hosted a Global Ambassadors volunteer from the University of South Florida over the summer.

The Educational Adviser also participated in traditional outreach programs, such as attendance and support of the World MBA Tour. In addition to giving presentations on Fulbright grants at the Ministry of Public Works, the adviser attended an MBA training seminar at Dartmouth's Tuck School of Business and gave a presentation on SEVIS at the Building Bridges II Conference held at the University of Seville.

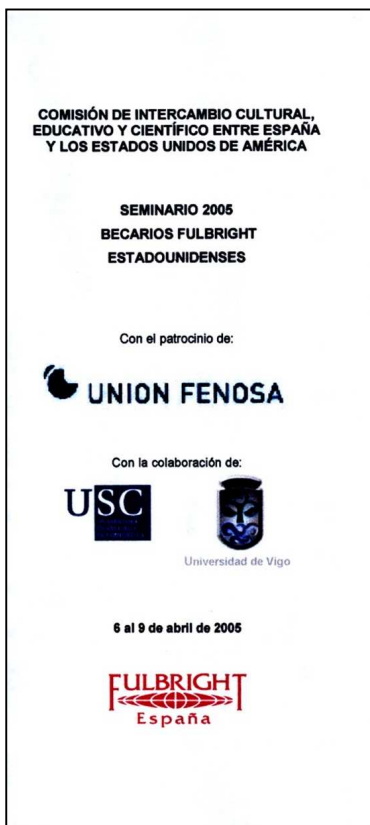
## **GRANT ENHANCEMENT**

### **U.S. Program**

#### *Orientation*

Fall orientation is a vital part of the transitional period of relocating to Spain. Participants included 27 predoctoral students, six senior lecturers and researchers, five teachers, and five teaching assistants (three in Spain and two in Andorra). Presentations focus on Spanish culture and salient current issues, then grantees are grouped into small discussion workshops that focus on their specific projects in which they can discuss their research projects, methodology and strategies; and receive useful feedback. The opportunity to meet and talk with Commission staff, the Spanish moderators and guest speakers, and with other U.S. Fulbrighters is invaluable, and especially appreciated by those who will be going to live in areas where there were no other grantees.

#### *Mid-Year Meeting for U.S. Grantees*



The Commission was successful in obtaining substantial sponsorship from local private and public sources (the electrical company Unión Fenosa and two universities, Santiago de Compostela and Vigo) to hold this year's mid-year meeting in Galicia, located in the northwestern corner of Spain. During the three-day program, over 50 participants, including the Commission's Co-Chair, Co-Treasurers and one of the American Board members, visited both universities to learn more about the institutions and the region. Group sessions permitted the Commission to evaluate grantees' projects and experiences in dealing with new professional and personal challenges. A common theme was gaining confidence and the desire to pursue other professional interests that would enable grantees to continue to be a part of an international community. Local press coverage was abundant and highlighted by a series of interviews with grantees.

### ***Spanish Program***

Enrichment activities for grantees both before their departures as well as during their stays in the U.S. continued to be a Commission priority. These special events organized exclusively for Fulbrighters also make the Commission special among other exchange sponsors, which limit their activities solely to the financing of grants.

Pre-departure orientation sessions were provided for departing graduate students, scholars and educators. These sessions provided special opportunities to group grantees and convey the worldwide character of the Fulbright Program. Up until this time, grantee relations are mainly on an individual basis with Commission staff and the sense of being a participant in an international exchange program is not readily perceived. Activities included staff member discussions on grant administration topics; visa regulations; and, former grantees sharing both their personal and academic experiences as grantees in the U.S.

For a second year, the U.S. Embassy has been especially helpful in visa issuances. On orientation days, the Embassy allowed the Commission to take participants as a group for delivery of visa documentation and required personal interviews. A reserved time slot, outside of regularly scheduled public hours, was set aside specifically for grantees. This special consideration expedited the issuance of

visas for departing grantees and, once again, provided a positive perception of the Commission. For the largest graduate student group, the Deputy Chief of Mission, J. Robert Manzanares hosted a luncheon at his residence for departing grantees, which coincided with the welcoming of the newly appointed Ambassador to Spain, Eduardo Aguirre.

The Commission is also grateful for the funding provided by the U.S. Department of State for pre-academic training programs. In summer 2005, twenty-one graduate students participated - a notable increase over previous years (i.e., fourteen in 2004).

In addition to numerous activities organized by the IIE for grantees once in the U.S., a number of students also participated in regional Enrichment Seminars. Likewise, visiting scholars benefited from the professional and personal enrichment activities organized by CIES, the U.S. Fulbright Association and the National Council for International Visitors.
