I. INTRODUCTION

INTRODUCTION

During academic year 2007-08, the Commission continued on its track of steady growth and aimed to solidify further the balance in numbers of U.S. and Spanish grantees. Achievements were made, but the highlight of 2008 has been a series of projects to commemorate the fiftieth anniversary of the Commission in Spain.

PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT

The Commission will host an additional five English Teaching Assistants in Cantabria as of 2008-09. Expansion of this program to the first region outside of Madrid is thanks to financing from the Marcelino Botín Foundation, one of whose primary goals is the promotion of education in the autonomous Region of Cantabria.

The Commission was honored to host a Fulbright New Century Scholar for the first time in 2007-2008. Professor Michael Malahy Morris, Research Professor in Public Policy at the University of New Mexico, spent the greater part of the academic year in Spain (based in Granada). His multi-faceted project dealt with the complexities of human migration, issues on which he would like to foment a more active involvement of universities everywhere.

SPECIAL PROJECTS

Celebration of the 50th Anniversary

A variety of events and projects were carried out to celebrate the fiftieth anniversary. The Commission is proud of the positive reactions and feedback, especially from former grantees who contributed to their success. A brief description of activities follows:



• 2007. Perhaps the most exhaustive project was a study to reveal the sociodemographic profile of Fulbright grantees over the past fifty years. In order to measure the impact of the Fulbright Program in Spain, the study, based on quantitative-qualitative methodology, was undertaken to determine the intrinsic value of the Program by interviewing alumni over the past five decades. Telephone interviews lasting some twenty-five minutes were held with more than a thousand former grantees and in-depth personal interviews with 23 high-profile personalities. Although the conclusions were numerous and readily available in both languages, suffice it to say that the data corroborated that the extensive professional experiences of the alumni as a group form the very foundation of the current prestige of the Program.

• January, 2008. With sponsorship from the *Consejo Superior de Investigaciones Científicas* (Higher Council for Scientific Research), forty-eight participants, mostly former Fulbrighters, met to discuss "Cultural and Scientific Cooperation between the U.S. and Spain through the Fulbright Commission: Assessment and Future Challenges." The one-day meeting provoked an enthusiastic response that led to the planning of specific initiatives. These included an annual summer Fulbright Seminar for former grantees to gather with specialists from both countries to discuss and reflect upon current issues.

• March, 2008. The Commission offers annually a mid-year seminar for current

U.S. grantees in Spain to evaluate the progress of their projects and become familiar with a different Spanish region. This year, to celebrate the fiftieth anniversary, the city of Valencia was selected as host because of its outstanding universities that, together with Barcelona and Madrid, have the largest number of former Spanish grantees. The seminar program was intended to facilitate the evaluation of grants over fifty



years and the consideration of the present and future of the Program from the perspective of the U.S. participants. The hospitality offered by the University of Valencia and former Spanish grantees was exceptional as was the reception hosted by the Commission to honor former grantees.



• July, 2008. As a result of the January meeting of former Fulbrighters to assess the Program and its future prospects, one clear recommendation was to initiate an annual university Fulbright Seminar. Consequently, a five-day academic seminar, conceived as a trial-run, was held in El Escorial as part of the Complutense University's summer school program for credit and entitled "The Fulbright Program: A Half Century of Cultural and Scientific Exchange with the United States." The course content brought together twelve speakers, including the Executive Director of the Commission, who addressed diverse topics ranging from American Studies in Spain to the energy sector to the U.S. influence on Spanish business. The event generated a number of conclusions including a need to repeat this initiative and create a multidisciplinary Master's Degree in American Studies, supported by the Fulbright Commission in Spain.

• Over the course of the 50th anniversary, a special effort has been made to secure extensive **press coverage** (see opposite page). Through assistance from a former grantee in journalism, several articles have been published in major Spanish nation-wide newspapers, regional dailies, economic papers, university press and digital magazines. The Washington Post gave mention to the concert in Washington, DC performed by the Orchestra of New Spain, and the El Pais supplement in the International Herald Tribune featured a long item entitled "Half a Century of Building Understanding."

The Society for Spanish and Portuguese Historical Studies held its 39th Annual Meeting in Fort Worth, Texas, in April, 2008 and invited the Commission Executive Director to give the keynote speech on the occasion of the 50th Anniversary of the Fulbright Commission in Spain. It was an opportunity to



remind these important specialists of the historical role of the Program and its good standing.

The European Executive Directors biennial conference took place in Athens in April, 2008. The meeting was useful and helped sketch some future programs and polish the ones implemented recently, as well as review traditional ones in the different European countries. The Bologna Process and its impact on transatlantic exchanges were discussed, and directors worked on ways to minimize negative perceptions on the continent and, of course, in U.S. universities.

Commission staff welcomed the visit of the American Program Officer of the Turkish Commission, on June 4. The full-day program included a review of policies and practices of both Commissions and involved discussions of the Teacher Exchange program, Spanish programs for graduate students, and the American program, particularly the English Teaching Assistants programs.



PROGRAM PLAN AND ANNUAL REPORT COMPARISON

For academic year (AY) 2007-2008, projected program size in the annual budget proposal was overestimated by seven (7) awards in the actual figures as of September 30, 2008. The most notable variations in projected numbers are listed below.

U.S. Program

Three more grants were awarded in 2007 with major variations occurring in the following grant categories:

Graduate Students – left-over funds from the Graduate Student program enabled the Commission to offer six (6) unforeseen renewal awards.

Journalists – no grants were awarded since the Commission failed to receive qualified applicants for this grant category.

New Century Scholar - The Commission was pleased to provide assistance to one U.S. scholar.

Spanish Program

The Spanish Program was overestimated by ten (10) grants. Following are the most noteworthy variations:

Catalonian Regional Government – no grants were awarded. Local elections with a change in governing parties resulted in the postponement of the grant announcement. This visiting scholar program will be relaunched in AY 2008-2009.

Ministry of Public Works – no qualified applicants were received for this grant category.



II. GRANTEE AND ALUMNI ACCOMPLISHMENTS

U.S. PROGRAM

John Ochsendorf, graduate student researcher in Spain in 2000-2001, was made a MacArther Fellow in September 2008. He is a structural engineer and is currently an associate professor in the Department of Architecture at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Community Involvement, 2007-2008

Apart from carrying out their grant projects, many 2007 U.S. grantees volunteered their services for the community. The 38 English Teaching Assistants in Madrid were active within their respective school communities outside of work hours offering remedial classwork, helping on field trips and hosting meals with their Spanish colleagues. TA and graduate student community involvement in Madrid was often centered on activities with immigrants (Center for Hispano-Moroccans, *Monica Bhatt*; ATIME-Morocco, ACOBE-Bolivia, and Ruminahui-Ecuador, *Juan Gastelum*; Red Cross centers for immigrants and the elderly, *Jacqueline Demeranville* and *Mike McMahon*; and volunteering in a public library, *Susannah Cramer-Greenbaum*.)

The Model U.N. program was normally treated as an extra-curricular activity at the high schools.

In Granada, graduate student researcher *Naomi Goldenson* volunteered with a local organization that reaches out to new immigrants, *Thomas Heyne* visited homeless people, *Tania Rezai* engaged in activities with a Muslim women's group, and *Ahmed Teleb* volunteered at an immigrants' rights NGO.

Senior Lecturer in the Canary Islands, *Martha Montero Sieburth*, assisted in a research project under the auspices of the Spanish Government which has been in existence since 2006, serving to refine the survey administered to immigrants in targeted areas of Spain to assess health, education, welfare and economic indicators of social integration. The research was presented as part of a presidential session at the American Educational Research Association Meeting in Chicago in April 2008.



A group of grantees established an online forum called Fulbrighters for Multiculturalism and Diversity, which was born out of the Commission's mid-year seminar in Valencia. The group engages with issues having to do with immigration and diversity, where both ideas and work are shared with future Fulbrighters.

National elections took place in this reporting year and the following alumni have received high-ranking appointments:


Rafael Dezcallar Mazarredo, 1979 Fulbright student grantee, International Relations, Stanford University, named Spanish Ambassador to Germany.


Other outstanding achievements include:



He was the only Master's student to win two prizes this year receiving the following note: "*After reviewing the images you sent, Dean Wigley has requested that you send more images. 


Sara (Sally) Gutiérrez Dewar, 1998-1999 Fulbright-Ministry of Culture grantee, New School University, New York, won the South Africa Tri Continental Film Festival Audience Award for Best South African Film for her documentary film <u>Tapologo</u>. The film, co-directed by Sally and her sister Gabriela, explores the impact of South Africa's mining boom on labor camps and the brutal realities facing women. squatter Freedom Park camp accommodates a migrant workforce that mines the world's single largest source of platinum, and the women in the community service male miners as a means of basic survival. A group of HIV-infected former sex-workers have

created a network called Tapologo, and have learnt to be home based careworkers transforming degradation into solidarity and hope. This film provides a humanizing and honest lens to the courageous work of community activists working under desperate conditions.




"Tapologo" Film Poster





STUDY AREAS, ACADEMIC YEAR 2007-2008







V. NON-GRANT ACTIVITIES

EUROPEAN REGIONAL ACTIVITIES FOR U.S. GRANTEES

The Commission nominated and co-sponsored the participation of one and two graduate students, respectively, in each of the 2008 annual international seminars for U.S. grantees hosted by the Commissions in Germany (54th Annual Berlin Seminar) and Belgium/Luxembourg (Introduction to the European Union). As in recent years, several U.S. grantees joined in voluntarily in the Berlin Seminar.

The Commission was invited to select two participants among the graduate students and English Teaching Assistants to represent the United States for the first time at the Seminar of the "Escuela de Oriente" (June 26 to July 2, 2008, Balearic Islands) organized by Casa Asia. Other participants represented Spain, Iran, Pakistan, Japan, China, Indonesia, Vietnam and India. The seminar consisted of group presentations on topics concerning intercultural experiences and globalization, followed by debates, and included a platform of activities such as workshops and outings.

ACADEMIC INFORMATION SERVICE (Educational Advising)

The Information Service informs the general public in Spain on Fulbright grant opportunities and provides free, unbiased information on study at U.S. universities and English Language schools. U.S. citizens receive guidance on Fulbright grants and study opportunities in Spain. The Information Service maintains a reference library and holds group and individual advising sessions.

This year the Service advised 7.1% more Spaniards than in AY 2006-2007. This is the result of more outreach, as well as the Service's deliberate promotion of group advising sessions. The latter effort was rewarded by a nearly 40% increase in group session attendees, allowing advising staff to reach more people in a more efficient manner.



Continuing Initiatives

Outreach efforts were stepped up over the past reporting year and included visits to various Ministries, universities, high schools, conferences, seminars and college fairs. In addition, the Information Service held 48 Fulbright / graduate study group advising sessions at the Commission. Technology continued to be incorporated into traditional outreach initiatives by fielding questions on *Expansión* magazine's online edition in what proved to be the Service's first online group information session.

Highlights

Over the past year the advising staff has benefited from numerous professional development opportunities. Highlights included travel to Valencia- in honor of the 50th anniversary celebration- for the Fulbright Commission's Mid-Year Meeting and being hosted as a special guest for the NAFSA Region IV Regional Conference in Kansas City. The European Council of International Schools Conference held in Madrid in November 2007 gave the adviser the opportunity to share information on the Spanish educational system with numerous US university representatives. The Commission also funded the adviser's NAFSA annual conference attendance in Washington, D.C.

GRANT ENHANCEMENT

U.S. Program

Orientation

Held during five days in mid-September in Madrid, 67 new grantees were offered the opportunity to get to know the city, interact with each other and with former Spanish grantees and members of the academic and professional communities, discuss their projects and goals, and to learn more about the Commission's support system. The program included a training session for high school TAs on the Model UN program. Once again, the Commission invited the new grantees in Andorra, four TAs. Edward Aguirre, U.S. Ambassador in Spain, warmly welcomed the grantees at the closing reception (see picture on the right).





Mid-Year Seminar for U.S. Grantees

The second meeting with 71 U.S. grantees to Spain and Andorra was held in late March in Valencia, Spain's third largest city and home to a cluster of universities. There was a marked spirit of collegial harmony for evaluation and general exchange of ideas. It served as an orientation for recently arrived grantees, and reunited those who began in September. The program of activities included individual and panel presentations and a talk by the University of Valencia as well as simultaneous group sessions to discuss work and personal concerns. As part of the 50th anniversary celebrations, Spanish Fulbright alumni were invited.

Global Classrooms, Model U.N. Program

For the second year, the Commission's 13 high school English Teaching Assistants Madrid in participated in the Model U.N. Program by training their students both in English language skills and the protocol of U.N. proceedings. The Madrid Conference was held February 14-15, when Commission the could appreciate the enormous progress in the students' presentations. Eight Spanish high school student delegates were sent to New York for the UNA-USA MUN Conference.

Spanish Program

Enrichment activities are provided to grantees over the entire cycle of an award - before grantee departure, upon arrival in the U.S., throughout the grant period and as alumni upon returning. These special Fulbright activities enhance the Commission's reputation as a leader in the educational exchange field, increase public visibility and portray the binational institution as a public-oriented entity that provides services that go beyond the mere awarding of financial benefits.



As in past years, pre-departure orientation and group visa processing sessions were provided for graduate students, scholars and educators. These sessions provided special opportunities to bring together individuals from various grant categories and backgrounds to form a cohesive group. Activities included staff member discussions on grant administration topics and visa regulations as well as alumni sharing personal and academic experiences.

The U.S. Embassy in Madrid continued to be especially helpful in issuing visas. For the past five years, group sessions specifically for Commission grantees have been arranged to facilitate visa processing and required personal interviews. This special consideration expedites the issuance of visas for departing grantees and, once again, provides a positive perception of Commission services.

For the largest group – forty-eight (48) students representing nine (9) grant categories and sponsorship from eleven (11) public and two (2) private institutions - the group visa processing session was followed by a luncheon hosted by the Deputy Chief of Mission at his official residence. The Andorran Commission, represented by a staff member and one student grantee, also participated in the day-long pre-departure orientation and visa processing session.

Other enrichment activities included an assessment and follow-up meeting at the Commission for returning 2007 participants of the Summer Institute for Outstanding European Students program. This initiative, which targets 18- to 22-year old students from underrepresented populations, allowed an opportunity to share experiences and provide program recommendations.

The Board Secretary of *El Corte Inglés*, a major department store chain and Commission sponsor for the past 20 years in the Fulbright/CEOE Foundation program for journalists, hosted a luncheon for the newly selected candidate and program alumni. This annual event enables the Commission to acknowledge this generous sponsorship as well as provide a venue for returning grantees to reunite in support of the program.

Numerous events in celebration of the 50TH anniversary of the Commission also involved the active participation of both current Spanish grantees and alumni. The Commission engaged Spanish alumni in special activities such as the evaluation and interviewing of prospective candidates for Fulbright awards.

Once in the U.S., grantees were also able to enjoy enrichment activities provided by collaborating agencies. The Commission is grateful for the funding provided by the U.S. Department of State for pre-academic training and Gateway Orientation programs. In summer 2008, seventeen (17) students participated.

A number of students also participated in regional Enrichment Seminars organized by IIE. Likewise, visiting scholars benefited from the professional and personal enrichment activities organized by CIES, the U.S. Fulbright Association and the National Council for International Visitors.
