I. INTRODUCTION

INTRODUCTION

In the past, it has been remarked that the Commission was seeking to achieve a healthy balance in numbers of U.S. and Spanish grantees. During academic year 2008-2009, the goal has been obtained with exactly 89 new grantees on each side of the overall program. Other activity has been marked by program development, special projects, and professional visits and travel.

PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT

The Commission continues to witness an extraordinary interest on the part of the Spanish regional governments in the teaching of English at primary and secondary schools throughout the country. As of the 2009-10 school year, seven Fulbright English Teaching Assistants, through an agreement with the Valencia Regional Government, will be serving as teaching assistants in primary schools around the area.

In February and March of 2009, two Model UN conferences were held in Spain, in Santander and Madrid, respectively. The two conferences, a culmination of much preparatory work, would not have been possible without the participation of the 20 Fulbright ETAs in Madrid and the five in Santander. These Fulbrighters acted as the major players as chairs, co-chairs and secretaries of the various committees. At the conclusion of the meetings, ten students from Santander and ten from Madrid were selected to attend the final conference in New York together with three Fulbrighters.

The conferences, an initiative of the United Nations Association of the United States of America (UNA-USA), represented a collaborative project supported by the Commission, the Regional Government of Madrid, and the U.S. Embassy. Merrill-Lynch provided financial support in Madrid. In Santander, the program is promoted by the *Marcelino Botín* Foundation and local educational authorities. Partnership with UNA-USA has meant a boon to the Fulbright ETAs in that it has provided a specific and effective tool for the teaching of English in Spain.

SPECIAL PROJECTS

Celebration of the 50th Anniversary


The 50th anniversary has been a welcome means for the Commission to gain further recognition through events open to the public, but it has also been an impetus for internal improvement. Examples of activities are described below:


November, 2008. The Commission sponsored a concert, at the International Institute of Spain, in which all musicians were former Spanish grantees and a U.S. current grantee. They included the guitar, piano, violin, viola and cello. The conductor of the Orchestra of New Spain, a past U.S. grantee to Spain, put together a delightful repertoire of works by composers Joaquín Turina, Max Reger, Bohuslav Martinu and several by former grantees.





The "Sociological Study of Fulbright Grantees from Spain", carried out in 2007, and the book "Westerly Wind – The Fulbright Program in Spain", finalized in 2008, were prepared for distribution by the publishing house *LID Editorial Empresarial*, courtesy of a former grantee who produced the two volumes with special consideration. The book also includes a CD, which contains, both in English and Spanish, graphics and statistics, a record of the various events held throughout the anniversary year and an updated directory of grantees. The study, undertaken also by the company of a former grantee, and the book serve to underscore the relevance of fifty years of cultural, educational and scientific exchange between the two countries. The two works, bound in a set, will be presented at the final 50th anniversary ceremony on November 17, 2009.





 A new website is being developed to replace the current one that, at six years of age, is already lacking in many ways due to quick advances in this area. Work began during summer 2009, and the new web is expected to be up and running by the beginning of year 2010.

In addition to providing general, updated and dynamic information about studies in the USA, the Commission will also make it possible for Spanish candidates to complete applications on-line and to upload supplementary documents. This action will drastically reduce the amount of paper until now consumed as well as



the time involved for both applicants and personnel. Virtually all aspects of grant management will be handled through the web in an easy and efficient manner, and selection committee members will have electronic access to the applications they will be evaluating.

• The Commission is developing a Professional Alumni Network whose aim is to offer the U.S.-Spain Fulbright community a means to share knowledge; to cooperate in research projects, conferences, and seminars; to exchange professional opportunities; and, in brief, to facilitate the professional relationship among alumni of similar interests. In addition, it will strengthen cooperation and the ties between the Commission and its alumni.

The trial platform is already being tested by Commission staff and the site http://redfulbright.es will be officially presented at the 50th anniversary closing ceremony in November 2009.

Professional Visits and Travel

The Commission hosted a visit by the Director of University Placement Services of the International Institute of Education (IIE). This visit allowed a unique opportunity for newly selected candidates to meet with an IIE official and receive first-hand information on U.S. admission processes and preparation of admission documentation as well as knowledge of the IIE role and services in the administration of Fulbright student awards. Commission staff benefited from a highly informative overview on the latest trends in higher education in the U.S. At the request of IIE, the Commission also assisted in the organization of a reception in Madrid to celebrate the 90th anniversary of the IIE.

In 2009 the Executive Director participated in meetings where she spoke of the Fulbright English Teaching Assistants in relation to pre-university bilingual programs in Spain at the University of Salamanca, joined other panellists on the roundtable "Cultural Relations between the U.S. and Spain" in Barcelona, and at the *Complutense* University of Madrid talked of North America in Europe within the context of Anglo-American Thought. In January, she also undertook professional meetings with the International Institute of Education in New York and in Washington, D.C. with the Department of State, the Embassy of Spain and the Council for International Exchange of Scholars.

Warm appreciation also goes to the Institute of International Education (IIE) and to the Council for International Exchange of Scholars (CIES) for their grantee support services.



PROGRAM PLAN AND ANNUAL REPORT COMPARISON

For academic year (AY) 2008-2009, the projected figures in the annual budget proposal were overestimated by twenty-three (23) awards as of September 30, 2009. The most notable variations in projected numbers are listed below.

U.S. Program

The program size of 100 grants for U.S. citizens was accurately projected. The only variation included one less Senior Lecturer.

Spanish Program

The Spanish Program was overestimated by a total of twenty-three (23) grants. The most notable variation occurred in the Ministry of Education visiting scholar program which was overestimated by sixteen (16) awards. Due to conflicting schedules, postponed reporting dates and restrictive visa considerations regarding prior U.S. experience, a considerable number of candidates withdrew from the Program.

It was also very stimulating to see different cultural activities such as theater, dance, music, and cinema. A beautiful surprise was to discover the Unitarian, Universalistic Church where I performed my solo-show to raise money for a school in Kenya. Finally I would like to say how lucky we were that our daughter could attend middle school: she had a great time learning, making new friends, and singing in the choir." II. GRANTEE AND ALUMNI ACCOMPLISHMENTS

U.S. PROGRAM

Ambler Holmes Moss, Jr., Professor of International Studies at the University of Miami—Coral Gables and Senior Lecturer in Barcelona in 2009, was elected as a corresponding member of the Catalan academy, the *Institut d'Estudis Catalans*. The installment ceremony took place on June 18, 2009, when he delivered his oration in Catalan titled La situació de Catalunya en el marc de les actuals relacions internacionals.

Ethnomusicologist and musician Canyon Cody, 2007-2008 graduate student researcher in Granada, studied the musical history of the region and worked with a diverse group of musicians to connect different cultures and generations through time. As a result he produced a 14-track album called "Granada Doaba" that mixes flamenco, Andalusian and hip-hop. In August he was interviewed on NPR, when he talked about his album's musical, historical and social undercurrents.



Community Involvement



Grantees increasingly contribute to service projects in their area of expertise, most frequently with youth groups and organizations for immigrants and refugees. A sampling of volunteer work is illustrative. Valerie Brender conducted translations of testimonies and professional reports as well as human rights research at the refugee group CEAR. Erin Cusack collaborated with three NGO's in her neighbourhood and in several professional training meetings. Ramón Cristóbal provided refugees with legal and social assistance. Kristina Christoph volunteered for a Catholic church benefit youth group in Madrid.

immigrants. *Marisa Diaz* volunteered at SEDOAC (*Servicio Doméstico Activo*). *Nicole Nfonoyim* helped organize employment workshops for documented and undocumented immigrants at *Centro Hispano Africano*. *Molly Scruta* tutored at the Hispanic-Moroccan Community Center and was involved in their calendar of cultural events. *Shruti Gupta* performed with a group of magicians to do shows at hospitals for children. *Darya Kraynaya* promoted the organization "We Love Spain" and helped organize events and trips.

Jesse Feinberg volunteered at an NGO in Granada, collaborating on an immigration-related magazine. Musician Michael Unterman helped with volunteer outreach performances at a preschool in Barcelona, and in a center for autistic children. Roberto Dominguez volunteered at a local Red Cross in Santander. Michelle Dezember worked with immigrants in a Barcelona community center, part of her research project in intercultural dynamics.

Many grantees in Madrid worked together as a group in the spring in fundraising activities and other service projects in their schools and neighborhoods.



Elena Arceo Rebollo, 2006-2008 Fulbright/Ministry of Education visiting scholar Organic Chemistry, University of California, Berkeley is part of the research team that discovered an inexpensive procedure removing oxygen from biomass. If it can be effectively industrialized, the procedure could allow many of today's petrochemical products, including plastics, to be made from biomass.

Mikel Armendáriz Leoz, 2008-2010 Fulbright MBA student, Duke University, participated with classmates in a Habitat for Humanity project. The group helped build a house for a low-income family. According to the student "this experience has shown me the large, positive effect that every one of us can have in the community by dedicating a bit of time to people who might not have the resources to pay for a decent house or to pay for their children's education. " Mikel continued to participate in later projects, building more homes and planting trees in a local neighborhood.







Laida Azkona Goñi, 2004-2005 Fulbright / Ministry of Culture student, Performance, Trisha Brown Dance Company, received the first prize for performing arts at the *Encuentros de Jóvenes Artistas Navarros* (Meeting of Young Navarran Artists). Her work - Red Cars, Fear and Coffee Makers performance that combines contemporary dance with plastic, audiovisual and sound-space creation. The work was coproduced by the Government of Navarra and supported by the Culture Centers of Noain and Zizur, the Choreographic Center Charleroi Danses and De Pianofabriek, Kunstenwerkplatz, Brussels.





The book draws on the author's personal experiences and impressions of everyday life in the United States. Cristina María Goberna Pesudo, 2006-2008 Fulbright/Regional Government of Andalusia student, Advanced Architectural Design, Columbia University, was awarded the Young Architecture Forum prize of the Architectural League of New York. The Young Architects Forum is a prestigious, annual competition and series of lectures and exhibitions organized by the Architectural League and its Young Architects Committee. The Forum was established to recognize specific high quality work and encourage the exchange of ideas. Participants in the program are chosen through a portfolio competition that is juried by distinguished architects, artists, critics, and the Young Architects Committee.

Víctor Manuel Navarro Loro, 2007-2009 Fulbright/Ministry of Education visiting scholar in Biophysics, University of Washington, was granted one of the "Endocrine Scholars Awards" during the Endocrine Society's 90th Annual Meeting. The prizes are awarded to recognize research trainees outstanding for achievements in basic endocrine research. The research focused on a novel neurotransmitter called kisspeptin which regulates the activity of the pituitarygonadal axis and may offer treatments in a number of reproductive disorders such as puberty onset delay and infertility.

The research was also published in Earth and Planetary Science Letters. His additional research on the volcanic resurfacing evolution of Venus was presented at the American Geophysical Union annual meeting and will be published in Icarus.



Pablo Sáinz Villegas, 2005-2007, Fulbright / Ministry of Culture student, Guitar Performance, Manhattan School of Music, was presented with the El Ojo Crítico ("The Critical Eye") Award in Classical Music given by the Radio Nacional de España (National Radio of Spain). This award follows a series of events in his career such as his debut with the New York Philharmonic and the Mto. Frühbeck de Burgos at New York's Lincoln Center, as well as his debut at the Musikverein in Vienna.

Álvaro Santana Acuña, 2005 Fulbright student, Master's in History, University of Chicago, was awarded the XXXIX Leoncio Rodríguez Prize in Journalism (2009) in recognition for his work on the defense of the historical heritage of the city of La Laguna, Spain (a UNESCO world heritage site). The award-winning article tells of the discovery of the remains of a 400-year old street in the historical center of the city, whose existence was until now unknown to locals, scholars, and most notably, the institutions responsible for the protection of the city's historical heritage. The author condemned repair work on a nearby house which might destroy the historical remains and offered an alternative to restore their historical significance.







NON-GRANT ACTIVITIES

EUROPEAN REGIONAL ACTIVITIES FOR U. S. GRANTEES

Again this year, the Commission met the commitment to co-sponsor one graduate student grantee for each of the 2009 international seminars hosted by the regional Commissions (the 54th Annual Berlin Seminar and the Seminar on the European Union and NATO in Belgium and Luxembourg). In Berlin two musician grantees performed at the gala, seven music and voluntary graduate student and ETA grantee participants joined in the activities. Feedback from all was enthusiastic.

Casa Asia invited for the second year two Fulbright graduates to participate in an international seminar, Escuela de Orient, in the Spanish Balearic Islands, from June 25 to July 1.

As the other participants were other young people from Iran, Pakistan, Japan, China, Indonesia, Vietnam and India, the seminar is a very productive forum for the exchange of topics on intercultural experiences and globalization.

EUROPEAN REGIONAL ACTIVITIES - SPANISH PROGRAM

At the request of the Belgian-Luxembourg Commission, applicants from Spain for the Fulbright-Schuman Program were interviewed and prescreened by the Commission. The program, administered in Brussels, offers awards for research, postgraduate study or lecturing on E.U. affairs or U.S. – E.U. relations at a U.S. university. For academic year 2008-2009, one (1) candidate from Spain participated.



The Commission also hosted the Program Officer and Educational Adviser of the Italian Fulbright Commission. The visitors were especially interested in receiving the staff's views and experiences on topics such as grant administration and educational advising activities.

ACADEMIC INFORMATION SERVICE

Mission and Services

The Information Service informs the general public in Spain on Fulbright grant opportunities and provides free, unbiased information on study at U.S. universities and English Language schools. U.S. citizens receive guidance on Fulbright grants and study opportunities in Spain. The Information Service maintains a reference library and holds group and individual advising sessions.

This year the Service advised a total of 5,323 people interested in studying in the Unites States via individual and group advising sessions, outreach events, e-mail and telephone. This number increased 42.51% from the previous year. Demand rose in every category, with e-mail advisees almost doubling. The Commission website also received a substantial number of hits. Of the 277,692 total 206,088 were directed to pages on how to apply for a Fulbright grant (grant information, frequently asked questions and how to prepare an application) while the Information Service's specific section received nearly 72,000 hits.

New Initiatives

With so many Spaniards relying on the website for information the Commission has responded by designing a new, more interactive site that will re-energize the Commission's image and bring EducationUSA to the forefront. The Commission has received generous backing from ECA for the project, which is in the initial stages of development and design.



Outreach

Outreach efforts were stepped up over the past reporting year and included a total of 17 visits to various Ministries, universities, high schools, college fairs and language schools. The adviser also attended the NAGAP and EAIE conferences. In addition, the Information Service held over 40 Fulbright / graduate study group advising sessions at the Commission, including special sessions organized to coincide with visits from US university representatives.

GRANT ENHANCEMENT

U.S. Program

Orientation



Orientation was held in Madrid for 69 grantees, principally graduate students and ETAs, from September 9 to 12. It is the ideal time for grantees to get to know each other both in small working groups and in casual social events that included former American and Spanish grantees, to be briefed on a host of practical, nation-wide and local issues of immediate interest, and to mingle with Commission staff. The incoming ETAs in Andorra also participated throughout. The Commission was honored to have the U.S. Ambassador, Edward Aguirre, personally welcome the grantees at the reception.

Mid-Year Seminar for U.S. Grantees

For the first time in over 20 years, the Commission held the mid-year meeting outside of Spain, in the principality of Andorra, from February 25 to 28. United States Embassy in Spain, with jurisdiction in Andorra, the Government of Andorra and the local Fulbright Program there contributed to the program of activities including group presentations, sessions for cultural enrichment, and simultaneous smaller group discussions. The group of 73 grantees was the largest of Commission's meetings to date, and included the recently arrived senior scholars, one of whom is a former Ambassador himself.

Global Classrooms and other School-related Activities

Although Global Classrooms and the Model U.N. Program were described in the introduction, the Commission would like to reiterate in this section how much the high school ETAs benefit by serving as tutors and role models during the extensive conference preparations.

Both elementary and high school ETAs became involved in a range of projects within the schools and in the schools' larger community, heightening their visibility and own sense of purpose.

Spanish Program

Enrichment activities enhance the Commission's reputation as a leader in the educational exchange field, increase public visibility and portray the binational institution as a public-oriented entity that provides services that go beyond the mere awarding of financial benefits. These special Fulbright activities are provided to grantees throughout the award period - before grantee departure; upon arrival in the U.S.; during the grant period; and as alumni upon returning.



As in past years, pre-departure orientation and group visa processing sessions were provided for graduate students, scholars and educators. These sessions provided special opportunities to bring together individuals from various grant categories and backgrounds to form a cohesive group with common interests. Activities included staff presentations and discussions on grant administration topics, clarifying visa regulations as well as alumni sharing personal and academic experiences.

The U.S. Embassy in Madrid continued to be especially helpful in issuing visas. For the past six years, group sessions specifically for departing Commission grantees have been arranged to facilitate visa processing and required personal interviews. This special consideration expedites the issuance of visas and, once again, provides a positive perception of Commission services.

For the largest group sixty-three (63)students representing twelve (12) grant categories and sponsorship from eleven (11) public and two (2) private institutions - the group visa processing session was followed by a luncheon hosted by the Deputy Chief of Mission at the U.S. Embassy. The Andorran Commission, represented by a staff member and one student grantee, also participated in the day-long pre-departure orientation and visa processing session.



The Board Secretary of *El Corte Inglés*, a major department store chain and Commission sponsor for more than 20 years in the Fulbright/CEOE Foundation program for journalists, offered a luncheon for the newly selected candidate and program alumni. This annual event enables the Commission to acknowledge this generous sponsorship as well as provide a venue for returning grantees to reunite in support of the program.

Numerous Commission activities involved the active participation of both current grantees and alumni. The Commission also engaged Spanish alumni in special activities such as evaluating and interviewing applicants for Fulbright awards. In order to improve services available to former grantees, a professional alumni network will be launched.

Grantees in the U.S. were also able to enjoy enrichment activities provided by collaborating agencies. The Commission is grateful for the funding provided by the U.S. Department of State for pre-academic training and Gateway Orientation programs. In summer 2009, twenty-five (25) students participated, including eight (8) Foreign Language Teaching Assistants (FLTAs) that attended program-specific Gateway Orientation sessions. A number of students and FLTAs also participated in regional Enrichment Seminars organized by IIE. Likewise, visiting scholars benefited from the professional and personal enrichment activities organized by CIES, the U.S. Fulbright Association and the National Council for International Visitors.
